She is a socio-cultural anthropologist working on communicative practices in the context of transnational migration between Peru and the US.

Sumit Guha is Professor in the Department of History at Rutgers-New Brunswick. His current research interest is in the political, cultural and linguistic processes by which identities take historical shape. Sumit focuses primarily on western and central India.

Leslie W. Kennedy is University Professor in the School of Criminal Justice and the Division of Global Affairs at Rutgers-Newark. Leslie's primary focus is to conduct original analytical, objective research on how risk assessment can be applied to the study of security.

Regina Marchi is Assistant Professor in the Department of Journalism & Media Studies at Rutgers-New Brunswick. Regina's research examines the intersections of culture, media, and politics. She is also interested in how the Day of the Dead celebrations in the U.S. entered into the cultural mainstream.

Kurt Schock is an Associate Professor of Sociology and Global Affairs at Rutgers-Newark. Kurt has published a number of articles on strategic nonviolent conflict, social movements, and political conflict. His current research focuses on land reform movements in the global South.
